Commenting on this quote from the composer Roger Holloway:

"I am often inspired, direct or oblique, by life, literature, landscapes & cityscapes, paintings, reflections, etc: but more often still by music itself---the innateness of it."

Alda writes: The art of Donnagh McKenna gives me the same type of inspiration; his gigantic work with its abstract language

somehow shares the same power of expression. Even the language used to describe his work is similar to the one describing the music of Robin Holloway's sonata, strong colourful language, drama, beauty, diversity, contradiction. I didn't have the chance to know Donnagh while he was alive but I am pretty sure, judging from his work, that his creative inspiration was stirred up by life, by all that surrounded him, and he experienced it and expressed it full of passion and with obsessive dedication to his art.

It will be a very interesting experience for myself as a performer, but more so, for the audience, to take in the music and the art and to see how these two different art forms come together to create a unified vision about the world we live, life, beauty and everything we hold dear in our existence.
